Blood protection

Goat hair

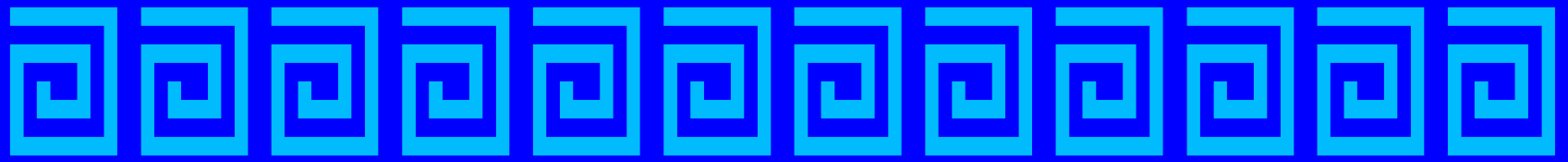


Ordinary tent

Main Separations

Camp of Israel is separate from nations.

Courtyard separate from camp (by Levite camp).

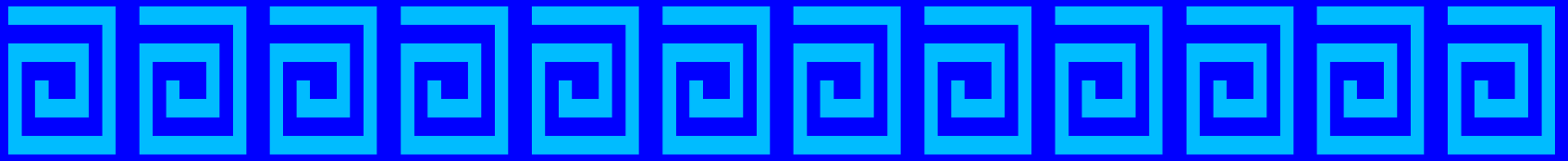
Holy place is separate from courtyard.

- 4 coverings; curtain; frames

- Only priests enter

Most holy place separate from holy.

- High priest enters once a year.

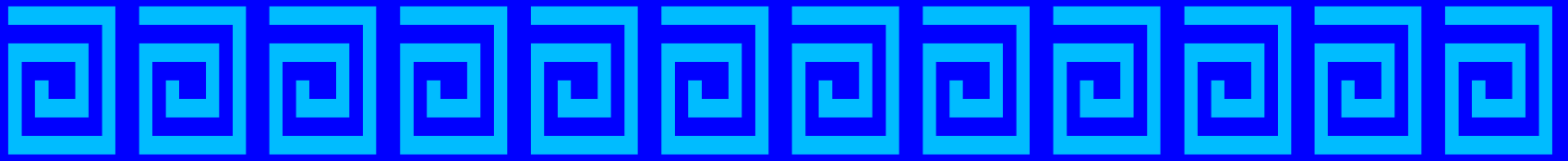
Application to Us

Fellowship with and imitation of God is foundational for your living.

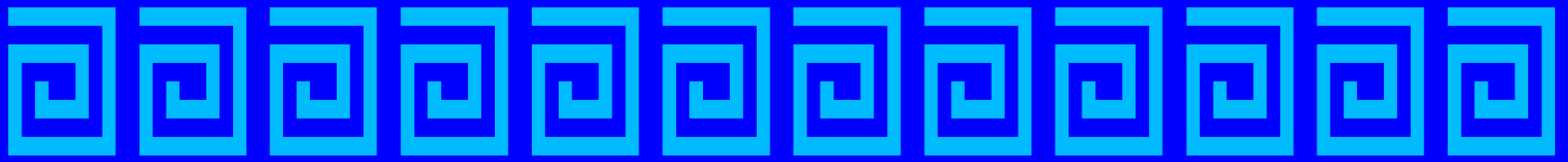
God cares for all that he has created.
